Sarah Cowley-Ross Olympian Guest Speaker






Earlier in the month we were fortunate to have Sarah Cowley-Ross speak to us about her journey and determination to become an Olympian.

Emergency Dental Care for Children Year 8 and below



Emergency Care for Children Year 8 and below

We would like to inform our patients and community that unfortunately Piopio Dental has made the difficult decision to discontinue the Ministry of Health Emergency Dental Contract for Year 8 and below. We can still see children year 8 and under, but it will be private treatment.

The School Dental Service, also known as Community Oral Health, is supposed to see all children Year 8 and younger annually for all their dental treatment, examinations, and preventative care. A dentist who holds the emergency contract is only there for the rare occasions that a child cannot be seen by a School Dental Therapist and has a dental emergency/toothache.

As you are aware our rural community has not received regular care for our children from this service for many years. Covid has not improved the situation. Piopio Dental opened in 2017 and since this time we have repeatedly offered to provide this routine care for our local children. It would require a separate contract. Our only option offered has been the Emergency Contract.

When we wrote to inform the DHB in January of this year that we were not continuing the Emergency Contract, we also put a new proposal to them for us to provide regular dental care to our local community. We have received no response or acknowledgement of our email.

The fees provided for the Emergency Contract do not cover the actual cost of Dental Care provided to a patient. Due to our children not having regular dental care the numbers of children requiring Emergency Care was increasing significantly in our practise. We also had invoices owing from the Ministry of Health unpaid from 4 months prior. This tough decision came down to a financial one.

Dental Care for children Year 9 till before their 18th birthday is covered by a separate contract. We can still see these children under this Adolescent contract for free dental care.

ACC covers dental injuries from accidents, sports etc. We can see a child of any age if they have had an accident and damaged their teeth or mouth area.
